
UPCOMING SHOWS:

FIRST POPS:




Joel Cohen showed a four-cycle single cylinder engine using a single rotary valve. He described challenges in tuning the rotor chain tension.








BITS AND PIECES:



Ray Fontaine had a bronze casting assemble that was part of a model steam engine for a boat. He reported some significant dimension problems with

the castings and suggestions were made regarding repair options.

Charlie Reiter had a brass heat pump. He also showed internal gear segments for tractor wheels that were cut from flat stock using a water jet.






Thomas Blanchard showed a finger clutch engine made from Home Shop Machinist plans. He offered to share his jigs with anyone interested in the project. He also noted that the

September/October issue of Home Shop Machinist included a CAD article and an editorial addressing whether CAD topics were appropriate for the more general interest HSM or should be addressed in the more focused Digital Machinist. It was noted that Alibre is now offering a 180-day free trial and Solidworks offers \$20 academic licenses to veterans. This precipitated considerable discussion on CAD/CAM in general and relative merits of Alibre. No clear consensus emerged.







Peter Lawrence brought his Merlin and showed ongoing progress with supercharger. There was some discussion regarding viability of using a slip clutch to turn the impeller shaft as the way to start the engine.
